Firstly, can I begin by thanking all the children for their quite beautiful, amazing and wonderful entries to our World War 1 competition; we have been quite overwhelmed by the thought and care that has gone into so many of the poems, diaries, paintings and pieces of art. The eight winners are are shown on the back of this edition of The Gossip ... but many entries will be displayed at the end of the Y2 corridor as we prepare to commemorate 100 years since the end of WW1.

The First World War battlefields of the Western Front are located in a long line of approximately 450 miles from the Belgian coast, through the southern Belgian province of West Flanders and regions of northern and eastern France. As a fourteen year-old student on a history battlefield trip in preparation for my history GCSE, I remember being taken aback by the sheer amount of crosses in the ground at one of the many sites – rows and rows in every direction for as long as the eye could see. I can also never forget how moving it was to hear the 'Last Post' played at The Menin Gate in Ypres in Belgium – which still takes place every single day at 8 p.m.

Learning about the wars remains so important for our children and many of our families still have older members who have memories of the Second World War – memories and stories that we all must hear while that generation are still alive to share them first hand with us all. After 100 years, we can no longer hear, first hand, what it was like to fight in WW1 – we can certainly never really understand what people went through, but we can teach and educate our children about our history and the fact that so many of you entered our competiton and showed such empathy, makes us very proud indeed.

For any of our parents with older children, I would urge you to try and find the time to watch Peter Jackson's new film – 'They Shall Not Grow Old' – a moving documentary which has added colour and sound to the black and white clips that we are so used to seeing of young men signing up for the First World War. At one hour and 40 minutes, it is a long film, but perhaps one of the best history lessons we could give our children about WW1 – it will be screened in cinemas on and around Armistice Day and will also be on the BBC.

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.

Q: What is the most daring/exciting thing that you have ever done in your whole life?










The standard of competition entry was magnificent. Artwork, models, sculpture, writing and poems are all now on display in the Y2 corridor.
